## **Westwood School Goals**

- 75% of students in third grade, 58% of students in fourth grade, and 79% of students in fifth grade will be reading at or above the Lexile mid-point.
- -41% of students in third grade, 39% of students in fourth grade, and 50% of students in fifth grade will score at proficient or above on the ELA section of the Georgia Milestone EOG.
- -55% of students in third grade, 47% of students in fourth grade, and 41% of students in fifth grade will score at proficient or above on the Math section of the Georgia Milestone EOG.
- -52% of students in fifth grade will score at proficient or above on the Science section of the Georgia Milestone EOG.
